BELLEVUE REPORT

HERO House Bellevue had many accomplishments to celebrate in 2023!

- + Earned the highest accreditation that Clubhouse International offers, as acknowledgement of our diligent work following the 37 International Clubhouse Standards. We started by completing a detailed self-study, then did a great job during the 3-day accreditation visit.
- Started and grew a new Housing Program.
 Renting an eight-bedroom house on Beacon
 Hill as transitional housing for our members.
 We also supported and connected our
 members with a variety of resources to
 address their housing needs.
- Actively participated and built strong partnerships with several local organizations, such as 100 Women Who Care, Kirkland Rotary Club, Plymouth Crossing, Porchlight, Sound, and Nourishing Networks.
- Shared HERO House information at tabling events at libraries, Seattle Pride Walk, and the Martin Luther King Day Health Fair at Crossroads Mall in Bellevue.

SEATTLE REPORT

This year was full of exciting events and partnerships! We were thrilled to host Representative Liz Berry and enjoy a lunch visit with Julia Reed. who also mentioned us in her legislative update.

Our collaboration with Harborview Medical Center has grown stronger, resulting in a new bi-monthly tea ceremony led by an HMC peer. We also had the pleasure of hosting lunch for Harborview Behavioral Health staff and clients, and an introductory lunch for DESC staff.





We formed a new partnership with Plymouth Housing to create a transportation program for clients and worked with Seattle Central admissions staff to provide educational support.

Our presentations at Shoreline Universalist Unitarian Church, where we received a generous donation, and at a BHRD meeting with HHNW's CEO, highlighted our mission and successes.



Additionally, we were invited to meet with Fountain House United to share social practice tools, and presented to various mental health agencies, including Plymouth Healing Communities, Transitional Resources, and the City of Seattle's Sound Generations network meeting. These connections are vital to our growth and the expansion of our services.

EVERETT REPORT

Everett Clubhouse had an incredible year! In August, we hosted our first annual fundraiser and raised an amazing \$4,000. We've also begun exciting renovations in our new Hospitality Unit, complete with new floors and fresh paint throughout the Clubhouse.





For the first time, we participated in a legislative advocacy day in Olympia, WA, to request state support for Clubhouses. We also had a productive meeting with Councilwoman Megan Dunn and have started attending her monthly community resource meetings for Snohomish County to enhance our community involvement.

To improve our services, we upgraded our computers, Wi-Fi, and Work-Ordered-Day board for better performance and organization. Thank you to everyone who contributed to making 2023 a fantastic year for Everett Clubhouse!





MEMBER STORY





In 2023, Seattle Clubhouse put several members' hidden talents in the spotlight with our "Talkin Clubhouse." podcast hosted by Elliot T. and produced by many capable members and staff.

Our first episode premiered on September 12th. To date we have posted twentyseven episodes!

Members designed the podcast to provide updates on Clubhouse happenings. Members also wanted to use the platform to share their stories and highlight the role Clubhouse has played in their recovery. Members decided that using an interview style format would be a viable choice.

Our host of Talkin' Thursdays Elliot T collaborates with staff and members to create each show. He regularly interviews Clubhouse members. Elliot recently completed two podcasting courses. His professionalism and enthusiasm have inspired other members to pursue podcasting classes. We have two members enrolled in an upcoming class!

OUR PROGRAMS



Work-Ordered Day

The daily activity of a Clubhouse is organized around a structured system known as the work-ordered day. Members and staff work side by side as colleagues to perform the work that is important to their community. Members and staff share responsibility for running every aspect of the Clubhouse.

Employment Program

Returning to work is one of the biggest goals our members have, and we proudly support our members in going back to work. Our Clubhouses support members through resume building, interview preparation and skill building, transportation, dress code and on the job coaching. We offer three different tiers of employment supports: Independent, Supported and Transitional Employment, all geared to the support a member desires.

Education

As with employment, education is a real and immediate path back into the community. In addition to tutoring, the Clubhouses provide other in-house supports, such as utilizing the Clubhouse computers and a space to study and do their homework. The Clubhouse assists people to access educational opportunities in the community. From adult basic education through graduate school, Clubhouses assist members in pursuing their individual educational goals.

Transportation

We are committed to meeting members' transportation needs. Members unable to use public transportation can schedule drop-offs to and pick-ups from the Clubhouse.

Outreach

Members are always encouraged to participate in Clubhouse activities. Those who stop attending are contacted, in a variety of ways, to be informed of upcoming events as well as to check on their wellbeing. This is done with phone calls, emails, greeting cards, social media, newsletters, and texts. On occasion, members are visited at hospitals and/ or their homes in an effort to lift their spirits when the member is struggling or isolating.

Supported Housing

Our new Supported Housing program is building partnerships around our community to offer safe and affordable housing for our members, including an 8-unit rental home for members. As we expand into the future, we will assist members in securing housing, supporting members with rental assistance, and connecting members with vital housing resources.

Socials and Wellness

Each Clubhouse hosts weekly events to develop social skills. Members mutually support each other in these informal settings while having fun. Socials are usually free, or low-cost to all members and include activities such as museums, advocacy trips to the state capital, outdoor activities, and game nights.

Our Clubhouses support members to lead healthy lives in many different capacities. Our focus on mental wellness shows that our Clubhouses are a powerful demonstration of the fact that people with mental illness can and do lead normal, productive lives. Many of our wellness activities include healthy meals, yoga, meditation, wellness walks, wellness-focused socials, and many other wellness-related activities.



Admin (20% of total) = \$422,347.67




